# Lesson Plan, Study Questions and/or Discussions Prompts for Students:

- 1. The students will read the Miller (1986) version of "The Fourth Teaching: Knowledge prior to coming to class".
- 2. The instructor will ask leading questions to the class and guide through the structure and purpose of the text.
  - a. Who are the speakers?
  - b. How is the text organized?
  - c. What is the purpose of the writing?
  - d. What lessons could be gleaned?
  - e. Knowing this is a translation, how could that change the meaning or purpose?
- 3. The instructor will guide the class to examine specific language choices and context
  - a. What words are repeated?
  - b. What could they represent?
  - c. Why would this be of interest to the readers?
- 4. Would modern day readers react differently to the text than readers in the past? Why?

## Written Assignments and/or other Assessment Instruments:

1. A journal assignment for students might include: seeking out an old poem or old text and engaging in the process again by analyzing and evaluating the text. The student should provide a journal response that explains the rhetorical context, purpose, and characteristics of the text they chose.
