#### **Lesson Plan:**

This could be used as a classroom activity to prepare for a compare/contrast essay.

- 1. Students should read both the first chapter in Mann and the website information prior to coming to class.
- 2. Students should be put into groups to evaluate similarities and differences. Each group should evaluate the information they read and make distinctions about the information.
- 3. Students should decide what pieces of information are most interesting to compare or contrast and organize the information into a possible outline and develop a thesis statement for their practice essay.
- 4. Students present the information to the class with a discussion focused on thesis statements and the way the information is organized while connected to the thesis.

#### Written Assignments and/or other Assessment Instruments:

- 1. Students create a thesis statement reflecting the comparison of the two readings.
- 2. Students create a short outline focused around the thesis statement provided.
