Introduction to the Ethics of Christianity (PHIL 102)

#### **Teaching Module Goals:**

(PHIL 220) Introduce students to Christian thoughts on the Religious Ideas and Experiences, and how their world experience has affected them.

(PHIL 102) Introduce students to Christian moral thinking including compassion, justice, identity, family, relationships with other's faith community, and human rights.

### Study Questions and/or Discussions Prompts for Students:

What is the basis for Christian beliefs/philosophy? What shaped Christian thoughts and practices and give brief explanation of each.

What are the major sections of the Christian Bible (New Testament)? Explain two major Christian beliefs from each of those sections.

What other major Christian religious works, other than the Bible, have influenced the development of Christianity? List and explain the importance of each text.

Explain the origin of Christian people. What events, beliefs, & practiced shaped their identity? How have those beliefs and practices continued to develop?

Explain the importance of Incarnation in Christian thought (PHIL 220) and ethics (PHIL 102).

Explain the importance of Baptism, the Lord's Supper, the Crucifixion and Resurrection of Christ, and the Last Judgment in Christian thought. (PHIL 220).

What are the Creeds and how did it shape Christian thought and practice (PHIL 220)?

List some of the major moral values of Christianity (name the source), and explain their importance (PHIL 102).

What was the Reformation, and what major moral dilemmas were raised by it? What solutions would you offer and give reasons. Be specific rather than general in your responses (PHIL 102 & 220).
