Study Questions and/or Discussion Prompts for Students

- 1. In early America many groups sought refuge in the new country. Many came seeking religious freedoms. What political, economic, and social factors led Jews to immigrate to America?
- 2. U.S. history has many examples of groups were viewed as "others". Enumerate the ways Jews were viewed as other not only because religious beliefs but also because of what many Americans saw as their foreign dress, diet, and customs.
- 3. What role did the rabbi play in establishing the Jewish communities in America?
- 4. How did the Jewish community seek to define itself and shape it scultural identity in America?
