In Class Discussion/Instructor-led Questions:

Instructor will present to students the following questions:

- 1. How do you think the backgrounds and upbringing of each man impacted the political and religious road each would take in life?
- 2. In your text, *Muslims in America* by Edward E. Curtis IV there is discussion of the connection Malcolm X made with Muslim leaders outside of the United States. What is the significance of this connection? Martin Luther King, Jr. was a similarly internationally-minded leader, and yet contemporary Americans do not memorialize him as a global leader. Why not?
- 3. How are the principles of Islam reflected in Malcolm X's statement delivered to a New York press conference on 12 March 1964?
