World Religion: Buddhism Teaching Module Title: The Origins and early years of Buddhism

Teaching Module Goals:

1. Introduce students to the basic religious scriptures and the time frame of their origin.

- 2. Examine the cultural and religious environment that led to the spread of Buddhism.
- 3. Familiarize students with the basic components of Buddhist dharma.

Study Questions and/or Discussions Prompts for Students:

- 1. What was the cultural background of Siddhartha Gautama?
- 2. What was the political situation at the dawn of Buddhism? Who ruled India?
- 3. What are The Four Noble Truths?
- 4. What is The Eightfold Path?
- 5. What is Theravada Buddhism, and how does it differ from Mahayana Buddhism?

Written Assignments and/or other Assessment Instruments:

Come to class with written responses to these questions. We will discuss the answers together and have a brief lecture in preparation for a quiz, which I will give the students after this class session.

Important points to stress in classroom discussion:

- 1. Buddhism drew largely, but not exclusively, from the faith and philosophy of Hinduism.
- 2. Siddhartha Gautama's teachings differed in an important way from Hinduism in that he denied the existence of an individual soul (Atman).
- 3. Buddhism has egalitarian elements and in its origins implicitly challenged the class system and hierarchy of Indian society and Hinduism, but like all religions, it too developed hierarchies over time
- 4. Buddhism spread from India to East and Southeast Asia over the course of centuries.
