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World Religion: Islam Teaching Module Title: Muslim Immigrants in the United States

Teaching Module Goals:

- 1. Introduce students to basic information regarding Muslim immigration to the Americas.
- 2. Examine the background of forced Muslim immigration from West Africa.
- 3. Familiarize students with the basic historical events related to Islam in the modern United States.

Study Questions and/or Discussions Prompts for Students:

- 1. What was the cultural background of the first American Muslims?
- 2. What was the historical situation in West Africa and North America at the height of the importation of slaves to America?
- 3. How have American Muslims responded to the increasing diversity among American Muslims, e.g., African-Americans and immigrants from Arab, South Asian, and Southeast Asian cultures?

Written Assignments and/or other Assessment Instruments:

Come to class with written responses to these questions. We will discuss the answers together and have a brief lecture in preparation for a quiz, which I will give the students after this class session.

Important points to stress in classroom discussion:

What cultural factors were obstacles to the early spread of Islam in America? What were the results of these obstacles?

What were the sources of anti-Muslim sentiment following the 9/11 attacks?

How have American Muslims responded both to the 9/11 attacks and to the anti-Muslim words and actions of many Americans?
