



Juneteenth, Black Religion, and the Ambiguities of Freedom

Several discourses in the humanities are challenging how we talk about freedom and its relationship to religion. During this keynote presentation, Dr. Keri Day, Professor of Constructive Theology and African American Religion at Princeton Theological Seminary, will explore this fraught relationship between religion and freedom, especially Black freedom. Foregrounded by the Azusa Street Revival of 1906, Dr. Day will highlight the complex questions that emerge when discussing Black freedom, from political agency to securing liberation and flourishing.
